Question:

At the Special Meeting of the Finance Committee on 13 March, the Director admitted in reply to my question that there were arrears of wages in respect of public works. Notwithstanding the trial schemes, no efforts have been made by the Department to finalize the timetable for trial results to materialize the protection of labour rights as mentioned in paragraph 29 of the Budget. In this connection, would the Director of Architectural Services reply in writing on or before 21 March as to how payment of wages for workers can be ensured during the public works tender procedures involving \$29 billion each year?

Reply:

The Government is very concerned about the labour rights in the outsourcing services. For public works contracts, the Environment, Transport and Works Bureau (ETWB) has formed a Working Group in February 2005 to identify measures in monitoring payment of workers wages and control of multi-layer sub-contracting. The Working Group comprises representatives from the ETWB, Labour Department, Architectural Services Department (ArchSD), Civil Engineering and Development Department, Mandatory Provident Fund (MPF) Scheme Authority and members of various labour unions and construction industry associations. The proposed measures include:

- a. installing a computerised Smart Card System on site to establish records of workers' attendance;
- b. requiring workers on site to have a written employment contract with their respective employers;
- c. appointing a Labour Relation Officer to handle workers records and to assist the Labour Department in handling complaints on wage arrears;

- d. all workers to receive wages and arrange MPF contributions through bank auto-pay arrangements;
- e. requiring the Main Contractor to submit to Government copies of transaction records (including sub-contractors' submitted records) on wage payment and MPF contribution;
- f. restructuring sub-contracting to a maximum of two tiers for specified types of works and processes;
- g. prohibiting sub-contracting on specified works elements;
- h. Main Contractor's core management team must be their direct employees and these employees are prohibited from sub-contracting any works in the same contract; and
- i. reviewing the administrative sanctions on poor records of non-payment of workers' wages.

These measures are being implemented on a trial basis in an ArchSD building contract and a civil engineering contract, and will be extended to another ArchSD building contract of which works will commence in the latter half of 2006. Together with the industry, ETWB will closely monitor and review the results, with a view to implementing these measures in public works contracts by the end of 2006. A monitoring group has been established in January 2006 for this purpose.

Question:

It is stated in the 2006-07 Budget that over the next five years, the Government will earmark \$29 billion a year on average for infrastructure projects. Would the Administration elaborate on this by providing a breakdown by type of projects and the apportionment of the estimated expenditure between committed infrastructure projects and infrastructure projects under planning for each type of projects.

Reply:

There are about 900 infrastructural projects currently in progress, including some 70 new items scheduled for commencement in 2006-07. Their cost estimates and forecast spending in 2006-07 are summarized in the Estimates for the Capital Works Reserve Fund. In our current programme, there are also about 250 projects under planning. We will seek funding approval from the Finance Committee of these projects when they are ready for implementation.

Unlike recurrent spending, the expenditure on these projects spread over several years and their annual spending fluctuate in accordance with the actual progress of works. A detailed breakdown by project type is unavailable. We expect that on-going projects will constitute roughly one-third of total estimated expenditure over the next five years, with the remainder two-third likely to be incurred on projects under planning.

Question:

According to the replies in ETWB(W)045, the authorities will implement the Total Water Management Scheme, including the seawater desalination study. In this connection, would the authorities please advise the expenditure of this project? Apart from planning and developing new water resources, are there any measures or methods that the authorities in managing existing reservoirs to prevent the fresh water from being discharged into the sea owing to overflowing of reservoirs?

Reply:

Water Supplies Department is carrying out a consultancy study for completion in August 2007 to map out the long term strategies and to formulate implementation plans for the Total Water Management programme. The estimated expenditure for the feasibility study is \$5.2 million. The Department is also operating a pilot plant for completion in a year's time to study the desalination of seawater using Reverse Osmosis technology. The estimated expenditure for the pilot plant study is \$13.9 million

During wet seasons, draw-off from reservoirs to water treatment works is arranged so as to maximise utilisation of local yields and to draw down reservoir storage levels, hence reducing the overflow risk. At the same time, Dongjiang water supply is suitably reduced accordingly. All these measures help to minimise overflow from reservoirs.

However, the storage capacities of our reservoirs are limited. In particular for small reservoirs, the geographic constraint dictates their storage capacities. Overflow from such reservoirs will likely occur even under a single heavy rainstorm. Furthermore, in case of intensive, heavy and consecutive rainstorms, overflow from some other reservoirs may be unavoidable.

According to the reply in Reply Serial No. ETWB(W)043, the term contracts on vegetation maintenance of the Highways Department do not specify the number of workers for the works nor the minimum wages of labourers. How could the Government ensure the workers' wages and benefits in these outsourced contracts would not be exploited by the contractor companies? Would the Administration consider incorporating the relevant provisions in those non-technical works contracts involving greening, cleanliness and hygiene? If no, what are the reasons?

Reply:

Maintenance of vegetation on roadside slopes and along high speed roads forms part of our road maintenance works. Like all works contracts, we have adopted an open system for competitive tendering on the basis of a set of performance-based specifications. Any unreasonably low bids indicative of a reduced labour or material input will not be accepted. The current arrangement has generally been satisfactory.
