This high level co-ordinating mechanism is co-chaired by the Executive Deputy Mayor of Shenzhen Municipal Government and the Secretary for Development of the Hong Kong Government. The standing members comprise senior officials from both sides. The first meeting of the Joint Task Force was held on 10 March 2008 at Shenzhen.

The Joint Task Force will meet twice a year. Three Working Groups have been formed to look into the feasibility of developing the Lok Ma Chau Loop and the proposed boundary control point at Liantang/Heung Yuen Wai. The Working Groups will report their work progress to the Joint Task Force regularly.

Civil Engineering and Development Department and Planning Department will jointly commission consultancy studies for the "Three-in-one" and Hung Shui Kiu New Development Areas (NDAs) within 2008-09. The proposed provision for the "Three-in-one" study is \$50.8 million (MOD prices). For the Hung Shui Kiu NDA study, the latest estimated cost will be around \$38.5 million. These studies would be managed by the concerned departments as part of their normal duties mainly by redeployment of existing staff. In addition, two senior professional posts have been created in 2007-08 and three professional posts will be created in 2008-09 to administer the studies for the NDAs in the concerned departments.

At the Development Bureau level, the work relating to these studies is done within existing manpower resources in the Planning and Lands Branch. It is mainly handled by the Permanent Secretary (Planning and Lands), a Deputy Secretary, a Principal Assistant Secretary and an Assistant Secretary as part of their normal duties and will continue to be so in 2008-09.

The "Land Use Planning for the Closed Area" Study is now underway. The draft conceptual plan and draft development plan are scheduled for public consultation by May and December 2008 respectively. The study will be completed in mid 2009.

We will stagger the studies for the "Three-in-One" and Hung Shui Kiu NDAs. Consultants will be commissioned to carry out the former study in June 2008 for completion in June 2011. For the latter study, we plan to commission consultants in December 2008 and complete the study in December 2011. Comprehensive public engagement will be undertaken as an integral part of the two studies.

The provision of MPF contribution under Personnel Related Expenses covers the Government's contribution to the MPF Scheme for civil servants on new probationary/agreement terms. The reduction of \$9,000 (20%) for 2008-09 is due to the anticipated transfer of a civil servant in the Planning and Lands Branch from the MPF Scheme to the Civil Service Provident Fund Scheme in 2008-09, upon confirmation to the permanent establishment.

In 2008-09, the Government will, in conjunction with the Harbour-front Enhancement Committee (HEC), continue with the Urban Design Study for the New Central Harbourfront and embark on the Hong Kong Island East Harbour-front Study. The studies are carried out to further the commitments of the Government in protecting and enhancing our Harbour for the benefit of the community. #### Reply:

(a) The Development Bureau (DEVB) plans to commence a review of the Urban Renewal Strategy together with the Urban Renewal Authority (URA) in the next few months mainly to consider how the relative weightings of redevelopment, preservation, rehabilitation and revitalisation should be rebalanced in taking forward urban renewal initiatives. A territory-wide public engagement process will be launched. The URA has agreed to provide the necessary manpower and administrative support to the Government. Any other expenditure required on the part of the DEVB will be absorbed within existing resources.

- (b) Following consultation with the Wan Chai District Council (WCDC) in January 2008, a special committee chaired by the Deputy Chairman of the WCDC has been set up to map out the overall plan for revitalising old Wan Chai. The special committee comprises members of the WCDC, representatives of the DEVB and the URA, and people from various academic, arts and cultural fields. Details of the revitalisation plan are now being worked out but it is expected to cover the open-air bazaar at Tai Yuen Street/Cross Street and other district priorities of the WCDC. The URA provides the resources and manpower to support the operation of this special committee.
- (c) Should the joint efforts of DEVB and URA to adopt a "district-based" approach to revitalise the old Wan Chai area become a success, we will consider extending the approach to the revitalisation of other old urban areas, taking account of the work priorities of DEVB and URA as such district-based efforts are likely to be resource-intensive.

- a. An Ex-gratia Allowance (EGA) exercise for fishermen affected by marine works projects is planned for the latter part of 2008, with an estimated 350 applications. The exercise is for a number of foreshore and sea-bed projects around Lamma Island and southern waters including:-
  - (i) extension of Lamma Power Station at Po Lo Tsui, Lamma Island;
  - (ii) proposed 275kV submarine cable route from Lamma Island to Cyberport;
  - (iii) proposed installation of submarine gas pipeline from the proposed Lamma Power Station Extension to the northern boundary of Hong Kong Special Administrative Region waters;
  - (iv) Outlying Islands Sewerage Stage I Phase I Package C Yung Shue Wan Sewage Treatment Works & Outfall;
  - (v) proposed helipad at Yung Shue Wan, Lamma Island;
  - (vi) Outlying Islands Sewerage Stage I Phase 2 Sok Kwu Wan Sewage Collection, Treatment and Disposal Facilities; and
  - (vii) Drainage Improvement at Yung Shue Long New Village, Lamma Island.

- b. In accordance with established criteria, an EGA applicant has to fulfill the following eligibility criteria:-
  - possessing a fishing vessel not exceeding 15m based in or close to the affected waters;
  - possessing a valid Marine Department licence for the vessel;
  - having acquired the vessel and registered it with the Marine Department on or before the specified cut-off date;
  - proving that the vessel is suitable for fishing purpose and equipped with adequate and suitable fishing gear for the daily operation of fishing activities in Hong Kong waters;
  - proving that the vessel has been used for fishing purposes; and
  - giving evidence that the vessel is operated by a qualified master or qualified engineer.
- c. The total EGA payment for the scheduled exercise is estimated to be about \$3.7 million.

In 2006 and 2007, the JO received about 30 200 public complaints about water seepage and completed investigation on about 20 700 cases. Investigation on the outstanding cases will continue.

### Reply:

- (1) Emergency cases are dealt with by existing staff of the Buildings Department (BD). Officers responsible for different geographical districts would carry out emergency inspections during office hours as part of their normal duties in the respective districts. Designated officers are put on a duty roster to perform emergency duties outside office hours on a rotational basis. As emergency services are part and parcel of the Department's duties, there is no breakdown of the expenditure incurred in this area.
- (2) The average response times for BD's staff to attend to emergency cases during and outside office hours in 2007 were 0.88 hour and 0.9 hour respectively.

(3) The BD thoroughly reviewed the procedures in handling emergency incidents and shortened the performance pledge times for conducting inspections to emergency incidents during and outside office hours in August 2005. Instead of pledging to respond to an emergency incident in three hours irrespective of its location, the BD pledges to inspect emergency incidents in urban areas within one and half hours, in the new towns of the New Territories within two hours, and in other areas of the New Territories within three hours upon receipt of the emergency reports during office hours. For emergency reports received outside office hours, the BD will inspect the sites within two hours for cases in urban areas and new towns of the New Territories, and within three hours for cases in other areas of the New Territories.

The above revised pledge times have taken into account the longer travelling time required for staff to attend to emergency incidents in different areas of the New Territories both during and outside office hours. We consider the current pledge times appropriate and will continue to monitor our provision of emergency services.

#### Reply:

Out of the total of 791 emergency cases handled by the Buildings Department (BD) in 2007, only eight cases occurred outside office hours and fell under the category of the three-hour response time pledge (for areas in the New Territories other than new towns). Among these eight cases, the three-hour pledge was exceeded by 35 minutes in one case. As a result, the performance in this category became 87.5%. This case occurred in a remote village in Sha Tau Kok and the inspection was hindered by poor traffic conditions immediately after the hoisting of typhoon signal No. 8.

The procedures in handling emergency cases including the duties for staff to attend to emergency cases within the pledge time and the details of required reporting arrangements and established practices are stipulated in the BD's Emergency Handbook which all duty officers are required to follow. We will continue to monitor our provision of emergency services.

#### Reply:

The workload of the Buildings Department (BD)'s enforcement actions against unauthorised building works (UBWs) as captured in the "actual figures" depends on a number of variable factors, including the number of unauthorised structures existing in the buildings targeted for enforcement action as well as the readiness of and time taken by building owners to comply with the statutory orders. With the aim to removing the target number of 40 000 UBWs in a year, the BD will suitably adjust the number of buildings targeted for enforcement action, taking into account actual circumstances. The BD has been provided with adequate resources to adopt a multi-pronged approach in handling UBWs, including immediate removal of dangerous and new UBWs, annual large-scale operations to remove existing UBWs, and enhancing the public's awareness of problems of UBWs and their responsibilities as owners through publicity and education programmes. We will constantly monitor the progress of our operation in removing UBWs.

### Reply:

(1) In 2008-09, the Buildings Department (BD) will sustain action to improve building safety, targeting 1 000 old buildings for carrying out blitz clearance of unauthorised building works (UBWs) and repair of building defects, and 700 single-staircase buildings for clearance of illegal rooftop structures.

The target buildings are located in all districts in the territory. We estimate that about 40% of the target buildings will be on the Hong Kong Island, 40% in the Kowloon peninsula and 20% in the New Territories.

The above work will mainly be handled by existing staff of BD, with part of it outsourced to private consulting firms at an estimated cost of \$28 million for 2008-09.

(2) The above action will improve the safety conditions of the target buildings. The building owners and owners' corporations will have to organise to remove the UBWs and repair their buildings. The Administration will provide appropriate assistance and advice to them.

(3) The BD and the Hong Kong Housing Society (HKHS) will offer financial and technical assistance to owners in need. For example, owners with financial difficulties may apply for a loan from the BD's Comprehensive Building Safety Improvement Loan Scheme or from the Home Renovation Loan Scheme of the HKHS. The Property Management Advisory Centres of the HKHS will also provide assistance to flat owners and owners' corporations on building maintenance and management matters.

### Reply:

Since July 2006, the Buildings Department (BD) and the Food and Environmental Hygiene Department have extended the operation of the pilot Joint Office (JO) to handle public complaints about water seepage problems to the whole territory under a three-year programme. The JO has commenced a mid-term review on the effectiveness of the programme for the first 18 months of operation. The review will be completed shortly. No additional staff resource is required to carry out the review.

As the causes of water seepage vary, the investigation of suspected seepage sources involves a method of elimination through a series of systematic non-destructive testing and analysis of findings depending on the site conditions and needs of the concerned cases. To detect any seepage from a drainage pipe within a floor slab, for example, the investigator will pour coloured water into the sanitary fitment outlet and afterwards observe any water seepage underneath. Similar to the coloured water test for sanitary fitments, the coloured water ponding test is applied for floor or roof slabs. For suspected leakage from water supply pipes, the water meter flow check or reversible pressure test is applied. The infra red thermographic scanner can detect the variations of temperature, and hence is used to detect the presence of water on a surface.

Coloured water test and water ponding test are used in most cases. They are simple and effective tests for application in most situations and may attain a high success rate. However, no testing method or equipment would be able to detect the source if the seepage is very mild or intermittent. The JO does not keep statistical breakdowns on the tests applied in individual cases.

During the outbreak of Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome in 2003, the Buildings Department organised a territory-wide inspection programme of external drainage systems of some 30 000 private residential buildings and thereafter followed up with the enforcement of repair of drainage defects identified in 6 000 of these buildings. Most of the building owners have carried out the improvement or repair works voluntarily. For the remaining cases, we have issued drainage repair orders to the owners of some 2 373 buildings. While the required repair orders for 2 351 buildings have been complied with, repair works in the remaining 22 buildings are in progress.

For the clearance of district hygiene black-spots, we have issued drainage repair orders to the owners of 294 buildings. While the required repair works have been completed for 283 buildings, repair works in the remaining 11 buildings are in progress.

We will continue with the outstanding enforcement actions.

From January to December 2007, the JO received about 17 400 public complaints about water seepage and completed investigations on about 13 400 cases. Investigation on the outstanding cases will continue.

Emergency cases are dealt with by existing staff of the Buildings Department (BD). Officers responsible for different geographical districts will carry out emergency inspections during office hours as part of their normal duties in the respective districts. Designated officers are put on a duty roster to perform emergency duties outside office hours on a rotational basis. As emergency services are part and parcel of the Department's duties, there is no breakdown of the expenditure incurred in this area.

Out of the total of 791 emergency cases handled by the BD in 2007, eight cases occurred outside office hours and fell under the category of the three-hour response time pledge (for areas in the New Territories other than new towns). Among these eight cases, there was only one case in which the three-hour pledge was exceeded by 35 minutes. As a result, the performance in this category became 87.5%. This case occurred in a remote village in Sha Tau Kok and the inspection was hindered by poor traffic conditions immediately after the hoisting of typhoon signal No. 8.

#### Reply:

In estimating the number of loan applications and the amount of loans to be approved under the Comprehensive Building Safety Improvement Loan Scheme (CBSILS) in 2008, we have taken into account the experience and the actual number of loan applications received in 2006 and 2007. The improved economic climate in Hong Kong and the availability of loan/grant schemes operated by other agencies in recent years are some of the possible factors which affect the number of applications under the CBSILS.

The CBSILS has a very wide coverage and provides loans to individual owners of all types of private buildings. Applicants of interest-bearing loans are not required to go through any means-test and owners who have financial difficulties may apply for interest-free loans. The scope of the Scheme comprehensively covers the safety improvement needs of a building, such as building, fire, electrical and slope safety and removal of unauthorised building works. Its scope includes repair and maintenance works carried out both under statutory orders/directions and voluntarily. We consider the current requirements and coverage of the Scheme appropriate given its nature as a loan scheme aiming at all flat owners. However, we recognise the need to provide enhanced financial assistance to elderly owners in need and have therefore proposed to implement a new Building Maintenance Grant Scheme for Elderly Owners at a new commitment of \$1 billion.

With the aim to removing 40 000 UBWs in a year, the BD will suitably adjust the number of buildings targeted for enforcement action in accordance with the actual circumstances. The BD adopts a multi-pronged approach in tackling the problem of UBWs, including immediate removal of dangerous and new UBWs, annual large-scale operations to remove existing UBWs, and enhancing the public's awareness of problems of UBWs and their responsibilities as owners through publicity and education programmes. We will continue to monitor the progress of our operation in removing UBWs.

The increase in the estimate of the area of land to be granted in 2008 by way of private treaty is mainly due to the need to complete the grants of the sites occupied by existing public housing estates to facilitate the Hong Kong Housing Authority (HA)'s divestment of commercial properties therein. We hope to complete the land grants for a total of 58 sites involving about 400.17 ha for this purpose in 2008, as opposed to 15 sites granted in 2007 totaling about 152.25 ha.

The number of flats produced from lease modifications, exchanges and extensions in a particular year is related to the number of applications submitted and subsequently approved by the Lands Department (Lands D) in that year and the scale of residential development involved in such approved applications. For those applications involving projects of non residential nature (for example, commercial purposes), no flats will be produced as a result of approving such applications.

In 2006, Lands D approved a total of 11 applications containing residential development which would produce a total of 1 116 flats. In 2007, 16 applications containing residential development (including two major land exchanges) were approved involving an estimated total of 4 561 flats. Looking ahead to 2008, we estimate that a number of large scale developments will be approved, resulting in the production of around 6 600 flats.

There were 109 lease modifications, 13 exchanges and ten extensions completed in 2007.

The total acquisition/clearance costs are estimated to further increase to about \$1,057 million in 2008 as more private land will need to be acquired for the implementation of the planned Public Works Programme projects, such as (i) Resumption of land for Tai Po development – formation and servicing of Areas 12 (part) and 39, phase 2A and (ii) Drainage improvement in the Northern New Territories – package C (phase 2) – drainage improvement works at Tai Po Tin and Ping Che of Ta Kwu Ling and Man Uk Pin and Lin Ma Hang of Sha Tau Kok. Lands D staff followed up by inspecting the site again to ensure that the breach was rectified.

When a developer refuses or does not respond positively to Lands D's request for rectification of a breach of a lease condition in respect of provision of public facilities before the issue of the Certificate of Compliance (C of C), Lands D may refuse to issue the C of C. If Lands D's request for rectification is refused after the issue of C of C, civil legal proceedings may be instituted in respect of the breach of the obligation under the lease and for its enforcement. Prosecution is not applicable.

Prosecution against individuals for illegal occupation of government land is part of the land control work of Lands D. In 2008-09, it is planned that 16 additional staff (seven Land Executives, two Land Inspectors, three Senior Survey Officers and four Survey Officers) will be deployed to enhance land control work, including among others, prosecution work against illegal occupation of government land.

On the other hand, unauthorised squatter structures (not covered by the Squatter Control Survey in 1982 or structures which do not match with the survey records) will not be tolerated once detected. In 2007, 246 such unauthorised structures were cleared by the Lands Department.

The Lands Department (Lands D) set up in September 2007 a dedicated team comprising 45 posts to deal with land control cases accumulated up to 30 June 2007 in the New Territories (NT), leaving the eight NT District Lands Offices to focus on tackling land control cases post 30 June 2007. At the same time, seven posts were deployed to the four Urban District Lands Offices to help clear backlogs and deal with new control cases in the urban area. It is planned that 16 additional staff (seven Land Executives, two Land Inspectors, three Senior Survey Officers and four Survey Officers) will be deployed to enhance land control work in 2008-09.

Lands D at present is administering about 4 500 short-term tenancies (STTs). In view of this substantial number of STTs, a pragmatic approach is being adopted, involving issue of advisory/warning letters, termination of STTs and regularisation of technical breaches. Lands D is also conducting a review on the application of the long-established STT policies and practices. The need for additional manpower and resources will be examined after the completion of the review. In the meantime, a pilot scheme on outsourcing part of the STT enforcement work has been implemented since January 2008 in two of the District Lands Offices. The need for expanding the scope of the outsourcing work will be assessed in the light of the operating experience of this pilot scheme.

The Audit Commission conducted in 2006 a review of Lands D's administration of STTs. In this Audit Report, a number of recommendations were made, focusing on administration of rent arrears, monitoring of tenancies' performances and enforcement of tenancy conditions. The Audit Commission subsequently conducted a Value For Money Study on the temporary use of vacant government sites in 2007, making recommendations on the management of vacant site information, temporary use of vacant sites, and term contract arrangements and performance information. Lands D has implemented the recommendations made in both Audit reports by means of existing resources.

The Planning Department disseminates town planning information and provides enquiry services through our two Enquiry Counters and runs the Hong Kong Planning and Infrastructure Exhibition Gallery to showcase major planning projects in Hong Kong. In addition, the Department has also been organising outreach activities under the annual Outreach Programme since 1996-97.

Under the Outreach Programme, the Planning Department visits about 40 secondary schools each year. During the 2-3 day visit to a school, we exhibit panels on the town planning process and give talks to the students on planning topics. To supplement the outreach activities, we also station our Mobile Exhibition Centre (MEC) for displaying town planning information in the school during our visit.

We also stage exhibitions on town planning in shopping centres and station the MEC in public housing estates and public locations near parks and shopping areas with high pedestrian flow.

In 2008-09, \$520,000 has been reserved to cover the expenditure of the Outreach Programme on design, production and transportation of exhibition panels, production of publicity materials, staging exhibitions at shopping centers and running the MEC.

It is the objective of the Town Planning Board (TPB) and the Planning Department (PlanD) to improve the dissemination of statutory planning information to the public through various means including the TPB's website and the Statutory Planning Portal. As part of these efforts, the TPB in February 2008 has revamped the structure of its website to enable more efficient searches for information and allow on-line submission of comments on planning applications and submissions in relation to the plan-making process. The Statutory Planning Portal also allows the public to have on-line access to information on statutory plans, planning applications and other matters pertaining to the plan-making process. Besides, pursuant to the requirements of the Town Planning Ordinance, all meetings of the TPB and its committees (except for the parts held for deliberation and confidential items) are now open to the public and will be broadcast simultaneously for the public to observe in the Public Viewing Room of the TPB.

Owing to system limitation, our system could not support the uploading of TPB papers which usually involve voluminous plans and supporting technical assessments. Nevertheless, the agenda and minutes of the TPB meetings are uploaded onto the website. Except for confidential items, all papers are available at the Planning Enquiry Counters one day after they have been issued to TPB members. On the same day when the TPB meeting is held, the papers are available at the Public Viewing Room of the TPB for public inspection. The public can also forward their requests to the Secretariat of the TPB for consideration should they wish to inspect previous papers submitted to the TPB.

The PlanD will closely monitor the situation and identify areas for further improving the dissemination of planning information to the public as appropriate. It is envisaged that expenses incurred will be absorbed from within PlanD's existing resources.
